"THE CHAIN CENT"

In 1793, the United States struck a "chain reverse" cent. This cent was America's first large cent. It was also the first circulating coin officially produced by the United States. The chain reverse was only struck in the year seventeen-ninety three.

It is weird that the designer is unknown. The coin was engraved by Henry Voigt. It weighs 13.48 grams and the diameter is between twenty-six and twenty-seven millimeters. The obverse design has a Liberty Head with flowing hair. The inscription "Liberty" appears above the portrait and below the date. The reverse is an interlocking chain with 15 links, representing the 15 American states at that time. The outer edge is inscribed "United States of America."

The edge of these coins are decorated with bars and vines with leaves. Cedric and Isaac are two other YN's with articles on the Chain Cent. Nov & Dec Sand Dollars will publish them.

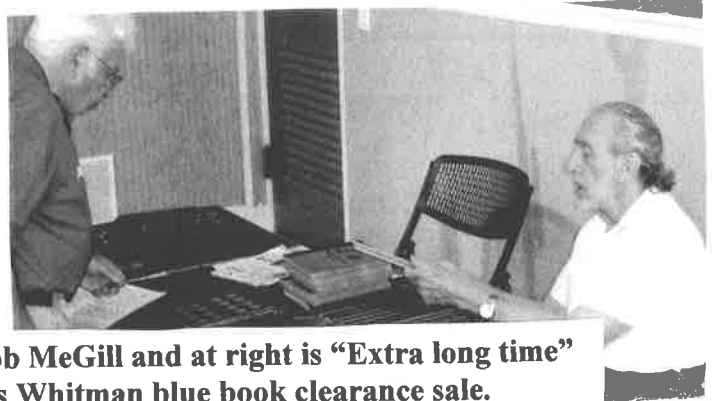
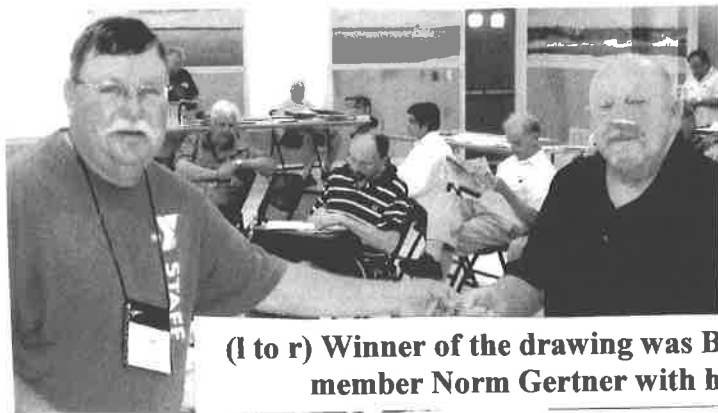

**COUNTERFEIT BILLS
PRINTED IN CHERRY HILL**
Print Shop closed down in May

Pretty close to home, 13 members of an alleged international ring with racketeering and other offenses, were caught printing high quality \$100 notes. Secret Service agents estimate about \$32 million high-quality \$100 notes were passed or seized in the United States since 2005. The article in the Asbury Park Press, a copy of the Courier-Post, said many of the bills were smuggled into this country from Israel, but some were made earlier this year at the Cherry Hill site.

During the May 28th raid, they found uncut sheets of counterfeit \$100 bills along with two off-set printing presses, three printing machines, two heat presses and approximately 20 printing plates bearing the U.S. Treasury seal, serial numbers and '100' in color shifting ink.

Checking accounts were opened in a Cherry Hill bank and thousands of dollars were being deposited and on one occasion A deposit of \$4,300 and \$5,200 were deposited into the same account within a matter of minutes.

**EARLY DAYS OF U.S. MINT
Long days of work**

The first U.S. Mint was closed only for the Fourth of July and Christmas, unless there was a yellow fever epidemic, in which case it was closed for months at a time. Workers at the Mint had to bring their lunch from home - - they were not allowed to go out. Once they arrived at 5:00 am, they were not allowed to leave until 8:00 pm - - quitting time. (That's a 15 hour day, boy did they need a union in those days).

They had a watchdog and only the night watchman could feed it. The dog was listed as part of their first budget and was paid \$3. Following is their first budget, excluding employee wages:

Straw, hay, horse medicine	2.00
Director's salary	2,000.00
Watchdog	3.00
Yard alarm bell	17.82
120 bushels of coal	38.00
Six pounds old copper	1.00

BERGEN IRON WORKS TOKENS

Low 142 in club Oct 16th auction

NO, THEY'RE NOT FROM BERGEN COUNTY - they're from Ocean County. These tokens were one basic design with minor differences in details and metals used in their manufacturing. They are all dated 1840. There are two distinct types/dies and two recognized varieties. In 1900, Lyman Haynes Low published a pamphlet that included the Bergen Iron Works tokens. There are three types and are identified by numbers 142, 143 and 144. In 1906, a supplement was published identifying a fourth variety and numbered as 180. Metals used in the manufacture of the tokens were brass and copper.

In the club auction of October 16th, a Low 142 brass with stars, framed in a plastic glass holder, as shown in previous exhibits, will be part of the auction.
