When it came time to testing our skills with a final grading test, I ranked third in the class. I unquestionably was able to leave Colorado Springs with a substantial improvement in my aptitude and confidence with grading coins.

However, I did not just leave Colorado with a progression in my grading ability. The ANA Summer Seminar for me is an experience like none other, one of uncommon independence where you meet an innumerable amount of others cut from the same cloth. From Georgia to California, I rejoined with old and made new friends for life. The Summer Seminar is a place where I can enjoy this hobby in an exceptionally unique manner, in a unique environment found nowhere else. I return to New Jersey every year thinking I am not only an improved numismatist, but an improved person. I could never have fathomed so much can be gained from a mere week. Returning to coin camp is something I look forward to the whole year round.

"WORLD'S FAIR" MEMORIES

I remember when I was a six year old kid, the World's Fair came to New York in 1964. Mom & Dad packed up us four kids, plus number five, still in the oven, and off we went to Flushing Meadow Park in Queens. The Fair featured landmarks still known today. There was the big hollow globe with the orbits of our spacecraft, this being the time of the great space race. Then there were the towers with the restaurants at the top which were used in the "Men in Black" movie. The aliens tried to escape earth using one of these as their spaceship. Nearby was the brand new Shea Stadium, home of the hapless (Dennis loves the Mets) New York Mets led by Casey Stengel.

I don't have many memories of the Fair since I was so young, but I do remember my mother telling me how she visited the last New York World's Fair in 1935 when she was eight years old. I bet she spent a bunch of shiny new Buffalo Nickels.

I think that the World's Fair was held every four years, liked the Olympic Games. It so happens that I was able to attend the next Fair which was held in San Antonio, Texas in 1968. Hemisfair 1968, it was called that summer and Texas sure is hot and dry that time of year. My Dad was born and raised in San Antonio and we were visiting his family. We had driven from Long Island, all seven of us in the family station wagon with no air conditioning. (Ah, the good old days). My oldest sister was 17 and did NOT want to be there & my baby sister cried the whole way down. My poor father, some vacation! We enjoyed the Fair and other tourist sights like the Alamo, but my highlight was something else. My childhood idol was Mickey Mantle and he was in Houston for the All Star Game, his last. Mickey was coming to San Antonio for the opening of a restaurant bearing his name, "Mickey Mantle's Country Kitchen." If you waited outside in line you could go in and meet the Mick. Dad took my brother and I. We bought some baseballs which Mickey signed for us. At 10 years old, I was so nervous that I could hardly speak when I met my idol. I almost ** my pants.

Being a full blown YN at the time, I had to buy the gold San Antonio Hemisfair 1968 coin (actually a medal) when I saw it for sale. I still have that coin and will pass it around at the next meeting. I'm counting on it being as valuable as the Pan-Pac gold coins some day soon. No such luck for my Mickey Mantle baseball. My little sister decided one day to use it in the street and that was the end of it.

I don't know what happened to the World's Fairs. I do not recall hearing about one for many years. I remember when I first went to the Epcot Center in Orlando it struck me as being very similar to the World's Fair with its various country pavilions. (continued in adjacent column)



"HOW COULD THEY?

Maybe the U.S. Mint should it. What I mean is maybe they should take a few old coins such as the two-cent piece, a large cent, etc and strike them with a date of 2016. If so, do you think there would be a market within the coin collecting community to generate some additional income for the government, while possibly recruiting new and young stamp collectors.

A recent article in the Washington Post covered just that by the U.S. Postal Stamp Service when in 2013, they reprinted a 1918 24-cent Jenny invert, the most famous stamp error in history. The agencies watchdog calls this instant manufactured stamp rarity was a hugh mistake breaking their own rules prohibiting postal officials from intentionally creating a rare stamp just to make money.

The upright Jenny was one of the first stamps to commemorate the start of air mail. It was issued at 24 cents in 1918 to commemorate the first mail carried on an experimental air service between Washington and New York. It shows a Curtiss JN-4 biplane or "Jenny," but in its haste to print the stamp, the Postal Service accidentally sold one sheet of 100 stamps with the plane in the center of the image upside down becoming instant collectors' items. Only one sheet of the inverts was ever found. A single stamp sold at auction in 2007 for \$977,500. More on the new Jenny repro in the September Sand Dollar.
